

The Twezimbe project for inclusion was designed to equip graduates with disabilities with essential business, finance, and employability skills. Following the training, participants are integrated into a Savings and Credit Cooperative (SACCO) - a social support system that enables networking with experts, resource pooling, and social support. Through the SACCO, participants not only acquire vital skills but also become an integral part of a supportive community that uplifts and empowers one another. This inclusive environment not only opens doors to financial inclusion but also fosters a sense of ownership and agency over their economic journey.

Among the 50 inspiring individuals who joined our project, 25 have made the courageous choice to pursue self-employment, resulting in the creation of approximately 20 small business jobs. Their remarkable achievements have not only transformed their own lives but also sparked a ripple effect of empowerment within our community. Through our network, we have successfully secured internships for 15 of our participants, providing them with invaluable real-world experience.

Additionally, 5 (10%) of our participants have been accepted into prestigious US government-funded global exchange programs, opening up extraordinary prospects for their further professional development.

At UPWDs, we bear witness to the power of determination, resilience, and unwavering commitment to success.

"We embarked on our Sign Language For All project with a deep sense of purpose and a burning desire to promote inclusivity and bridge the communication gap for the deaf community,"- Alex Ogwal, project coordinator.



People with hearing impairments face numerous barriers, including limited access to communication, societal stigma, and discrimination. Sadly, the negative perception surrounding sign language is prevalent and deeply rooted in misconceptions. 80% of individuals hold unfounded beliefs about sign language which creates barriers and inhibits their willingness to embrace sign language as a legitimate means of communication.¹

Recognizing the fundamental importance of communication in uniting communities and fostering inclusion, we implemented the Sign Language For All project. Our commitment lies in identifying and implementing effective strategies to teach sign language to community members, enabling them to engage and interact with deaf individuals, thereby promoting mutual understanding and inclusivity.

Our Sign Language For All project has exceeded all our expectations, blossoming into a remarkable success. We successfully organized the first Sign Language Debate, conducted entirely in sign language and centered around the theme 'Adopting technology is the only way to improve education of deaf learners." Furthermore, we have forged new partnerships and established new learning centers in multiple locations to expand our reach. With thriving centers in Makerere, Ntinda, Entebbe, and Jinja, we have successfully trained over 70 community members in sign language, fostering a deep understanding of diversity and promoting inclusion.

My Journey From being a Job seeker to an Employer

y name is Umayear Sekyanzi. In 2020, I graduated with a bachelor's degree in Microfinance from Kyambogo university in Uganda. I had high hopes when I landed an internship at the Uganda Virus Research Institute (UVRI), but then the unforeseen fate of COVID-19 pandemic struck. The pandemic left me jobless, and as the months turned into a year, I felt lost and uncertain, especially with the responsibilities of my family weighing heavily on my shoulders.

It was during this challenging time that my colleague, Harunah Damba, shared with me the incredible work of the United Persons with Disabilities (UPWDs). UPWDs filled me with a renewed sense of energy, hope and skills, but I lacked the financial means to embark on my own self-employment venture.

In 2022, everything changed when the Twezimbe Project for Inclusion was launched. It was a ray of light in my life. The project brought us together as a cooperative, providing us with the opportunity to transform even the smallest savings into meaningful contributions. Through this initiative, we underwent intensive training and mentoring in various aspects of business, finance, and employability. It empowered us to learn the art of saving, borrowing, and investing wisely.

With the training, pooled contributions from peers, and renewed faith, I took a leap of courage and opened my very own pastry shop, and my initial customers were my fellow colleagues in the project. Over time, my business found its niche in the market, steadily flourishing and providing sustenance for both myself and my family. Not only that, but also offering employment to two individuals from the project, who now assist me in the day-to-day operations of the pastry shop.

United Persons with Disabilities continues to forge ahead, creating a brighter future for ourselves and our loved ones.

From Struggles to Triumphs: My journey to independent living.

y name is Rogers Manishiimwe, and in 2018, I graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Social Sciences from Makerere University. As someone who had faced countless setbacks in securing employment, I had always harbored the dream of starting my own business. Yet, as a social science graduate, I encountered numerous barriers, particularly in understanding microfinance. I struggled with limited financial literacy and a lack of knowledge about various financial products. This hindered my ability to qualify for loans, potentially depriving me of the opportunity to kick-start my entrepreneurial journey.

Joining the Twezimbe project for Inclusion proved to be a turning point in my life. Through expert-facilitated training sessions, I gained invaluable knowledge in financial literacy including vetting lenders and developing responsible financial habits. Motivated by the valuable lessons I learned and the constant encouragement from my peers, I embarked on my entrepreneurial dream. Through the launch of the Twezimbe project, which organized us into a cooperative, I secured a microcredit that I utilized to establish my own vegetable garden on an unused piece of family land. Specializing in high-demand crops such as tomatoes and greens, my business not only caters to my personal needs but also paves the way for advancing my studies and supporting my siblings.

Looking back, I am indebted to my comrade, Mr. Harunah Damba, whose unwavering dedication swiftly mobilized us to join the project. His persuasive communication skills, emphasizing the profound benefits of joining UPWDs and its pivotal role in our development and empowerment, inspired me to become a member, a decision I will never regret.

Our diverse range of social projects, including poultry rearing, mushroom growing, beadmaking, and sugarcane plantation have not only resulted in an impressive capital formation of over 10 million shillings but have also created over 50 employment opportunities, empowering more than 100 individuals to lead independent and fulfilling lives.
